## **Course description:**

A review of the behavioral interactions in natural primate populations, drawing on experimental, observational, and theoretical studies. Discussion of ecological, physiological, and developmental bases of primate social behavior, with special attention to the evolution of patterns of behavioral interactions among individuals of different age, sex, relatedness, and status. Topics include sexual conflict, sexual selection, and mating systems; care of offspring and other aid-giving; manipulative and cooperative aspects of communication; competition, dominance, and territoriality; and the evolution of social relationships.

**Midterm/Final exam:** Exams will consist of short answer, fill-in-the-blank and multiple choice questions, based on the material covered in lectures, section, readings, and films. The final exam will be cumulative. Review sessions will be held prior to the exams to allow students to ask questions about course material.

**Sections:** Attendance at your assigned weekly sections is mandatory and is worth 5% of your section grade. For an absence to be excused, you must provide appropriate documentation from a medical professional, coach, etc. Any unexcused absence will be penalized with the loss of participation points for that section and three or more unexcused absences will result in the total loss of participation points for the semester. Switching between sections is allowed only under extraordinary circumstances and only with prior permission of the section leader. Sections will include both hands-on activities and group discussions of lecture material, readings, and films. Sections are a good time to ask questions about the previous week's readings. There will be no weekly response papers, but students will be asked to complete a weekly homework assignment that is due before the start of section. These are worth 10% of your final grade and will consist of a mixture of short-answer responses to weekly prompts. They will be graded as follows:

0 = not handed in, an incorrect answer and/or no indication of careful reading/understanding of the papers

1 = handed in, some incorrect statements and/or but do not indicate careful reading or understanding of the papers

2 = handed in, correct answer and/or indicate readings were carefully read and understood (i.e. synthesize ideas across multiple papers, or point out logical flaws or omissions in logical reasoning or methodology)

Three of the section exercises will require graded write-ups. The due dates for the assignments are indicated below. Unexcused late work will be penalized 10% for every 24 hours late. Details about each of the written assignments will be provided at the beginning of the relevant activity. Section times will be announced in the first week of class.

**Field Trip:** On Saturday March 31, 2018, we will be going to the Franklin Park Zoo (with the Primate Social Behavior course from Tufts!) to collect behavioral data on a group of gorillas. Data collected by each student will contribute to a large collective dataset to be analyzed for assignment 4 (15% of your final grade). The details of this trip (including the departure times) will be announced early in the semester, but please mark this date on your calendars. If you cannot make this trip, you will need to make your own arrangements to travel to the zoo before April 16<sup>th</sup> 2016 when your data must be uploaded to the collective dataset.
